

Beginning Music (K-2nd) \$10

Meyers

The goal of this class is to introduce young students to the joys of making music. We will be using simple rhythm instruments, kazoos, games, children's songs, and worship songs. In addition, we will use classical music selections to develop listening skills and introduce the basics of music notation.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 10

Physical Education (K-2nd) (3rd-5th) and (6th-8th) \$5

In Physical Education we will explore movement and space. We will learn about keeping our bodies fit aerobically and work on muscle strength, endurance, and flexibility. We will work on balance, agility, and rhythm. You will learn to throw, kick, dribble, bounce and hit different types of objects. We will use games and age appropriate challenges to increase your level of physical fitness. We will explore team sports such as soccer, basketball, baseball/whiffleball, and volleyball. During Physical Education class you will have the opportunity to work cooperatively with others and follow instructions while having fun.

Students are to come to class properly dressed for participation: athletic clothes (not street clothes) , tennis shoes with white soles and that tie or have velcro closures.

ABC's and 123's (K) \$25

We will explore our alphabet and numbers through hands-on fun. We will even do some sign language? There is not need for your child to bring anything to class, but their excitement for learning. All supplies will be covered. There will be occasional homework, but home assignments will be minimal.

Fun Through Science (K) \$35

What is the life cycle of a butterfly? How do batteries in a flashlight make it work? What is a crystal? How do you make goop? In this class we will learn about some basic science theories through fun experiments. All supplies are covered in the class fee.

Minimum: 5 Maximum: 15

Praise Dance (Beginning, Middle, and Advanced)

The first half of the year is spent more on classical ballet technique and then we incorporate what they have learned in the second semester learning choreography to contemporary Christian songs. The goal is to make the dance an act of worship to the Lord using the gift of dance to glorify Him. Because dance is not something that can be put into grades all students wishing to take this class should check with me for their appropriate level. Three levels are being offered as 3 different classes based on ability and not grade level. Most of the girls that were in the middle class last year should still be in the middle level.

Dance apparel and ballet shoes are required.

Minimum: 3 Maximum 15

American Heroes (1st-2nd grade) \$20

Anderson

A study of American heroes with some at home memorization. We will take a look into the character, career, history and geography of the Heroes. This class is a building block, an introduction to the people that you will be putting on the American timeline in years to come as they study U.S. History deeper.

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 14

Story of the World Ancient Times (1st-2nd grade) \$25

This class covers early writing and farming, ancient Egyptians, Sumerians, the Hebrew people, Babylonians, the Assyrians, Phoenicians, Ancient Greeks, Persia, the Roman Empire, the collapse of the Roman empire, early Christianity, and Attila the Hun and other barbarians.

Students will be assigned weekly reading, narration, and map work. It will take approximately 30 minutes at home each day.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 12

English 1/2 (1st-2nd grade)-\$25

Grammar doesn't have to be boring!! This class will use the Shurley English/Grammar curriculum and, with the help of poems, games and songs to help us, we will cover declarative, interrogative, and exclamatory sentences, basic parts of speech, complete and simple sentences, parts of a library, capitalization, punctuation, irregular verbs, tense, an introduction to prepositions, articles, narrative, descriptive, and creative writing and more!

A minimal amount of homework will be required.

The cost includes workbooks for each child, plus all materials needed for class.

Minimum: 6 Maximum: 20

Art (1st-2nd grade) \$45

In this class we will use art projects from the Usborne Book of Art and from other sources as well. We will use a variety of mediums. We will create art using crayons, soft pastels, oil pastels, sketching, watercolor, tissue paper, and clay. Some of the projects will be crafty in nature but always with an eye to art, for example painted masks, and/or other types of 3 dimensional work.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 10

American Girls (2nd-3rd, 4th-5th grade)-\$25

Spitzer/Evans/Nestor

Enter the historical time periods of the American Revolution (1774-1786), Civil War (1860-1864), Victorian Age (Early 1900's), The Frontier (1854), and Early New Mexico(1824) with the historical fiction works of the American Girls authors. In this class, students will be required to read one chapter book per week and complete assignments given for 4 days. Assignments will include a wide range of subjects like American History, geography, mapping, math skills, vocabulary, charts and graphs, research and biographies, character and Bible study, critical thinking, and art projects. Additional biographies might be assigned.

On class day, we will discuss the book of the week and highlight important events and people in history. Sharing time will be a chance for students to show off assignments they've completed at home. Projects will include sewing, arts and crafts, homemaking skills, food preparation, games, music and much more.

Minimum: 5 Maximum: 10

Animal Kingdom (2nd-3rd grade) \$50

Culley/Garretson

Students will learn about mammals, birds, fish, amphibians, reptiles, dinosaurs, and arthropods. There will be activities and games to reinforce the lessons. Each student will make an animal notebook to keep all their worksheets and activity sheets, as well as all the facts and photos of different animals. Students will also learn about their favorite animal and create a presentation about that animal. There will be weekly reading and writing in this class.

The text that will be used is God's Design for Life: The World of Animals from Answers in Genesis.

Outside work is required. Students may need to work from 2-3 hours at home per week. There will be some computer work. They will also need to do work on their favorite animal presentation. All books are included in the fee except each family should have an animal encyclopedia that contains information about animals in each of the groups we will be covering. Dinosaurs not necessary.

The Keepers at Home Club (Ages 7-16) \$42

The Keepers at Home Club will begin at Co-op this year. We plan to come alongside mothers as they prepare their daughters to become godly, competent women, skilled wives and mothers. The Club will not only include extensive skills for practical living and creative handiwork, but will provide for spiritual growth as well with a variety of Bible reading and memory work, and even a study on Proverbs 31. It is essential that mothers agree to work alongside their daughters on Keepers Handbook and Notebook selections for the duration of Co-op. We may continue meeting throughout the year if there is an interest.

Minimum: 4 No Maximum

Recorder Ensemble (ages 8+) \$25

Younger children will be considered if they can read and have some previous experience with music.

A beautiful instrument in its own right, the baroque recorder is also an ideal first wind instrument. It is inexpensive, easy to clean and durable. Mouth and finger placement are easier to learn on this small instrument, and these techniques transfer easily to other woodwind instruments. We will be reading pitches on the treble staff, learning to count rhythms, and working together as a group.

Cost can be reduced if you have your own music stand and case, and/or instrument.

Art (3rd&4th grade) \$45

For art we will be using Artistic Pursuits book 1 . An introduction to the Visual Arts. We will be using several different types of mediums. Children will be exposed to soft pastels, oil pastels, sketching, watercolor and clay. The last 5 weeks we will paint the Days of Creation in water color.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 10

News Current-God's World News (3rd-6th grade) \$12

News Current is written to help teach biblical worldview. It emphasizes news, knowledge, wisdom, and action.

News—stories are selected and presented to show how our merciful, sovereign God is active in the world.

Wisdom—It is written to build discernment and biblical perspective about what is happening in the world, which in turn will allow students to learn about, think, communicate, and be more effective ambassadors for Christ.

Action—Students are encouraged to recognize ways to act upon what they have learned—to become not only “hearers”, but “doers,” in the spirit of James 1:22.

God's World News magazines are published monthly, and there are many online additional resources that we will also be using. The co-op class will utilize the school schedule which consists of 8 magazines: Sept-May. Students will be expected to utilize and asses additional information online, at the God's World News website, as required. Some homework assignments will be given.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 12

Home School Choir (3rd-12th grade + adults) \$30

This is a class to equip the students in the area of vocal music. We wish to impart an appreciation for Christian music and to nurture our children's skill in music reading, singing and choral performance. Whenever possible, we would also like to nurture our children's instrumental music skills, especially in the area of accompanying our choir. We hope parents will also participate—as singers, helpers, and instrumentalists. The students in this class will also be required to perform at an end of year event.

There will be out of class participation of a least two visits per semester to nursing homes or shut-in's houses. We like to use the gift of music to minister to those in need

Minimum: 10 No Maximum

Technology 101 (3rd & 4th grades) (5th & 6th grades) \$35

Ferrer

Technology 101 is a basic technology course with an emphasis in Communication and Information Technology. The course will start with several core science lessons to serve as building blocks of the technologies that will be covered. Additional subjects that will be reviewed are history and technological advances, computers/equipment, telecommunication basics including: local, long distance, wireless, data. The course will conclude with an overview of internet policies, principles, language network, and applications. This course is a high level review of communication and information technology. It is designed to be an introduction only.

If you are looking for a course on social networking (facebook, twitter, myspace, etc.) web surfing, keyboarding, photo/image manipulation, computer repair, video creation, or how to play games on the internet, this is not the course for you. This is not an iPad, iPod, iPhone, texting kind of course. No tweets or facebook in this course.

There will be at least 2 presentations/projects: a technology of interest and a webpage with peer review.

Minimum: 5 Maximum: 10

Classical Writing - Aesop A-B (Grades 3-4) \$35

Mayrand

Classical writing is a writing program that teaches students the art of putting virtuous thoughts into words - true, and beautiful words. The Aesops A and B will teach the students to write through the use of Aesops Fables and Stories. The student will be learning and writing the fable/story passage in order while using dialogue, proper phonics, spelling, vocabulary, grammar, and comprehension. This program covers all the necessary English and writing work for a student. To that end, you should expect home assignments that are required. These assignments will range in length from 15-45 minutes a day.

Minimum: 5 Maximum: 10

50+44: Our states and the men who rule them (3rd-4th grade) and (5th-6th grade) \$18

Bent

Students in this class will learn the name and location of all 50 United States and their capitals. We will learn how the geography of a state influenced the formation of our country. We will also learn about each of our 44 Presidents and their notable accomplishments or contributions. There is a small segment on the US government and how it works.

There will be daily homework (approx. 15-20 minutes) plus memory drill work.

Students will complete at least two research reports: One on an assigned president; and one on an assigned state. There may be a book report as well.

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 12

Exploring Creation Through Astronomy (4th-5th grades) \$55

Wood

This book & course will cover the nature of astronomy, the structures of the solar system: from the Sun to Pluto, including the moon and asteroids, stars, galaxies, and space travel. Some of the fun notebook assignments include making a mnemonic phrase, a comic strip, an advertisement, and writing a play. The notebooking journal provides a place for the student to complete assignments, record experiments and display work. Included are scripture copy work with both print and cursive practice.

Outside work required: Star gazing & hope for a field trip in October or April. Homework as assigned, and hopefully reviewed by parent before class time. At least monthly online access, with parental supervision, for additional resources mentioned in the text or during class.

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 12

World History (5th & 6th grade) \$20

We will cover world history beginning with the Fertile Crescent: Cradle of Civilization, Egypt, Kingdoms and Empires, the Middle East Ancient and Modern, Europe, Greece, Rome, England and the British Isles, Asia, Africa, Australia, Oceania and Antarctica. We will break all these into the following units: Where History Began, Home of Western Civilization, Exploring the Earth as the home of man. This course will include geography and mapping as well as the histories of each of the main continents.

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 12

Pictures, Paintings, & Projects (5th-6th grade) \$24

Bent/Brammeier

This class is a combination of art history / art appreciation / and hands-on experimentation in different styles and medium. Projects will coordinate with lessons on artists and their works. Class periods will alternate between art history / appreciation and projects. Projects may be assigned from time to time as homework.

Class fee includes art supplies needed for the projects. Students will receive a variety of art supplies as their own.

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 10

Dramatic Arts (5th-12th grade)-\$25

Students will be introduced to different aspects of the theater, the main focus of the class will be mounting a production which will be performed at the end of the school year. Your student must be comfortable with reading and writing.

Exploring Creation w/ Human Anatomy & Physiology- Apologia (Grades 5-8) \$45

Fisher

The Students will be using the K-6 Apologia textbook and the lapbooking process to take an in depth journey into the Human Anatomy and Physiology. We will look at and learn about the skeletal, muscular, respiratory, digestive, cardiovascular, nervous, integumentary, lymphatic & Immune systems, the history of anatomy, the cells, health & nutrition, blood, and senses. Each student will keep a binder with hands on and written evaluations of his/her learning of the concepts. We will participate in classroom experiments and activities. **Students will be required to complete daily reading in his/her textbook and comprehension activities in his/her binder, at home during the week, to further enhance the topics learned in the classroom. I will provide all materials for the class during instructions. Parents must provide scissors, glue, crayons, pencils and the necessary time at home to complete the at home homework.**

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 12

Classical Writing - Aesop B - Homer A w/ Harvey's Elementary Grammar (Grades 5-7) \$55

Classical writing is a writing program that teaches students how to properly write using the method based on Greek progymnas-mata. It's aim is to teach students through the art of putting virtuous thoughts into words - true, and beautiful words. The Aesops B will teach the students to write through the use of Aesops Fables and Stories. The student will be learning and writing the fable/story passage in chronological order while adding dialogue, using the proper phonics, spelling, vocabulary, grammar, and comprehension. In Homer A the student will be using the skills learned in Aesops B to build on the longer and more challenging narratives. We will review these passages looking at more of the fables, bible stories, legends, myths, fairy tales, and nature studies. The student will be learning and writing the passages in a different chronological order while developing skills at reading analysis, vocabulary, grammar, and paraphrasing. While we are going through the Homer A lessons, we will also be working through portions of Harvey's Elementary Grammar program. The students will have workbooks for each of these three components of the program. **Students will be required to complete daily homework assignments in his/her workbooks to enhance the understanding of the concepts and processes of writing as we go over them in the classroom. I will provide the workbooks and passages for the students to use. Parents must provide pencils, and time daily to work on the assignments.**

The progression of these two levels of classical writing will be done at a quicker pace than expected per the manuals. They normally suggest the Aesops B be started in 4th grade and Homer A to be started in 5th grade but many older students lack the basis of writing skills. Therefore I'm am listing this class as 5-8th for the students that need those skills. If you would like to check out the program go to www.classicalwriting.com

Civil War History 1861-1865 (Grades 5-8) \$30

The Civil War was a pivotal time in our nation's history. Everyone has an opinion about it; but does everyone know the complete truth? In April 2011 (during co-op), the USA will recognize the 150th anniversary since Fort Sumter was fired upon, the event that marked the beginning of the War Between the States. We will be using the Homeschool in the Woods curriculum by Amy Pak known as Time Travelers. Your child will complete a lapbook and a notebook in this class. Homework completion is essential if you wish your child to gain knowledge about this important era.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 10

Pointe (by teacher approval only) \$15

Franz

In order to take the Pointe class, you must first have prior approval from Mrs. Franz and you are also required to take the praise dance class immediately prior to this class. The class will only last for a portion of the period, not the entire 55 minutes, at the discretion of Mrs. Franz. It is required that you are fitted and purchase pointe shoes in order to participate in the class.

Top Story—God's World News (6th-10th grade) \$12

News, knowledge, wisdom, and action!

News—stories are selected and presented to show how our merciful, sovereign God is active in the world.

Knowledge—It is loaded with practical tools (maps, charts, graphs, illustrations) to provide students with the knowledge base they may need to understand the varied current events and world issues these days.

Wisdom—It is written to build discernment and biblical perspective about what is happening in the world, which in turn will allow students to learn about, think, communicate, and be more effective ambassadors for Christ.

Action—Students are encouraged to recognize ways to act upon what they have learned—to become not only “hearers”, but “doers,” in the spirit of James 1:22.

God's World News magazines are published monthly, and there are many online additional resources i.e. Biographies, that we will also use. The co-op class will utilize the “school schedule” which consists of 8 magazines: Sept, Oct, Nov, Jan, Feb, March, April, May. Students will be expected to access & utilize information online, at the God's World News website, minimally once a week. Some homework assignments will be given.

Public Speaking (6th-12th grade) \$0

Did you know that public speaking is the number one fear. In the public speaking class we will try a variety of speaking categories from interpretative, informative, sales pitch, impromptu etc. We will cover how to write a speech, body language, verbal pauses etc. and then you will be given lots of opportunities to practice in a supportive environment. You will be expected to write several speeches some of which you will give, then edit and give again. You will need to practice at home to improve your delivery and style.

Cooking (7th-12th grade) \$50

Stubbs

Come learn the art of cooking good food for your family. We will study cooking tools and utensils, ingredients, recipes, and even table setting and etiquette. The class will extend into the lunch period every day, so your student should pack a lunch to bring on those days when the class is not eating one of their creations. There is a chance that this class will have to travel off-site in order to have cooking facilities.

Minimum: 5 Maximum: 14

Apologetics/Worldview 1 (6th-12th grade) \$40 (\$5 if you have all books)

Did you know that over 75% of our young people will walk away from the church? In the book *Already Gone* researchers asked young people why they had left and they said because the church could not defend their faith logically against the attack of “science”; and that they did not see how the Bible could answer tough questions. We will discuss what a worldview is and the consequences of worldviews. We will use a selection of DVDs from *Answers in Genesis* that cover such topics as the age of the earth, Noah’s ark, genetics, astronomy, and the origin of man. Students should be prepared to read each week from the *Answers 1,2 &3* book. Students may purchase books on their own from Answersingenesis.org. or Amazon.com. Or we will purchase the books for those who do not have them.

Maximum: 15

Apologetics/Worldview II (6th-12th grade) \$40 (\$5 if you have all books)

We will be using the all new DVDs from the Creation College 3 conference from *Answers in Genesis* and building on what we learned in *Apologetics 1*. Students will need to have the *Answers 1,2 and 3* books. Be prepared to read each week and take notes on outlines provided. It is not necessary to have taken *Apologetics 1* in order to take this class. Students may purchase books on their own from Answersingenesis.org or Amazon.com. Or we will order for those who do not already have them.

Maximum: 15

Latin I (6th-12th grade) \$40

Come join this adventure as we learn Latin: how to read, write, pronounce, and even speak it! We will learn songs in Latin and read familiar stories in this valuable language. In fact, in our first class, the students will receive an important list-- 10 reasons for learning Latin! See you there! There will be homework and the purchase of *Matin Latin I* and *Latin Primer I* is necessary. If you own either book, your fee for the class will be reduced accordingly.

Supplies to be provided by the family: index cards and box, and a 3-ring binder.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 15

Latin II (6th-12th grade—must have completed Latin I) \$40

The adventure continues as we finish *Matin Latin II*, *Latin Primer II*, and continue our work towards the goal of Wheelock’s Latin! Welcome back!

If you own either book, your fee for the class will be reduced accordingly. Supplies to be provided by the family: index cards and box, and a 3-ring binder.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 15

General Science Lab (7th-8th grade)-\$15

Lochner/Hardy

In weekly meetings we will conduct experiments from *Apologia General Science* modules. The purpose is for students to work the labs together and provide a break for mom from having to prepare the experiments. Students are expected to do all other work in the home. Students will be required to read through the modules, do the “On your Own” assignments, read the experiments prior to cop, work through the Study Guide and Module Summary and take tests at home under parental supervision. It is essential that students maintain pace with the lab schedule which will be provided upon enrollment.

Required materials: *Apologia General Science 2nd Edition Text, Tests and Solutions Key*. Notebook and pencil.

Minimum: 6 Maximum: 16

50 States Under God (7th-8th grade) \$35

McGuigan

In this course we will discuss each state from a Christian perspective, while giving an overview of the early days of the state. It will combine geography and history in such a way as to give an understanding of each states roots and its contribution to the union.

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 10

Writing (7th-8th grade) \$25

Mayrand/Sultzen

In this course we will use the Institute for Excellence in Writing program called Teaching Writing, Structure and Style. The program combines DVD presentations that are age appropriate with practice using the new writing tools and skills. It is broken into 9 units:

Unit I: Note Making and Outlines

Teaches students to make a "key word outline," preparing them to be freed from the problem of what to write about so they are able to focus clearly on how to write well.

Unit II: Summarizing from Notes

Builds on Unit I by showing students how to use style checklists to improve prose with strong verbs, quality adjectives, adverbs, clauses, sentence openers, decorations and more.

Unit III: Narrative Stories

Shows students a basic story structure and develops their ability to write stories using familiar stories as models.

Units IV and VI: Summarizing References & Library Reports

Prepare students to take notes from their sources and write library research reports without confusion and frustration. Presents a clear and powerful Topic/Clincher paragraph model.

Unit V: Writing from Pictures

Uniquely taps students' creative energies by writing stories from a series of one to three pictures.

Unit VII: Creative Writing

Gives students a method to "get information out of their brain" to use when writing anything, from short expository and descriptive essays to a decent letter to Grandma.

Unit VIII: Essay Writing

Provides students with the skill of writing formal essays of five or more paragraphs, developing the foundation for high school and university writing.

Unit IX: Critique Writing

Concludes the course, teaching a solid structure for book reports, reviews, and critiques.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 15

Life Skills (7th-12th grades) \$50

Hall

At a minimum this class will include as many of the following activities as time will allow: Cross Stitch, needlepoint, knitting, plastic canvas, soap making, paper crafts, rubber stamping, Christmas card crafts, macramé, decoupage, candle making with beeswax sheets, and basic car care. We hope to add other life skills as the opportunities arise.

Minimum: 6 Maximum: 12

French (7th-12th grade) \$30

Brammeier

Would you like to speak, read, and write French? This is the place. Using various resources including a text I will order online, we will learn the ins, outs, ups, and downs of the French language. Homework will happen, but the end result will be worth it. FYI-- French is the language of the business world in Europe!

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 15

Apologia Biology (9th-10th grades) \$25 first semester + up to \$20 max 2nd semester

Apologia biology is a college preparatory high school biology class. This course is designed for independent study by your student but we, the teachers, will serve as course facilitators coming along side the parent in the assignment of work, testing and grading requirements. We will be performing the laboratory experiments during the allotted co-op class time.

Outside work required-approximately 1 hour per day independent study.

Books required: Apologia Biology, 2nd Edition, Answer key, and Test booklet.

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 12

Foundations in Personal Finance (9th-12th grade) \$25

Barry

In this course we will use the Foundations in Personal Finance written by Dave Ramsey to “engage students by weaving relevant subject matter into an enriching and entertaining format.” Your student will study Saving and Investing, Credit and Debt, Financial Responsibility and Money Management, and Income/Careers, as well as The Power of Giving. The students will watch a DVD with Dave Ramsey and will have homework that will be assigned to go with the lesson plan. The teacher plans on giving a high school credit to each student so homework completion is required.

Minimum: 2 Maximum: 10

Computer Applications (9th-12th grade) \$25

Beaty

In this class students will learn the basics of word processing, spreadsheets and databases. We will also spend some time doing desktop publishing. The student should have the ability to touch type between 30 and 60 wpm. If they are not able to type, it will be very difficult to produce the required documents in a timely manner.

Maximum: 4 students (unless you have your own laptop you can bring to class)

20th Century American History (9th-12th grade) \$28

In this course we will combine the history of our country from the turn of the century through present day with an emphasis on the changing political, economic, and social climates. We will spend time on the world wars and the holocaust. We will use history to show how far we've turned from our Christian heritage in this nation and to show us where we are now. There will also be an economic portion of this class, using either Uncle Eric's book "*Free Market Economics*" or possibly the one called "*Whatever Happened to Penny Candy*".

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 10

Fiction Writing for Publication (9th-12th grade)- \$25

This class is designed for those interested in developing a work of fiction. We will work on short stories, plays, and novel ideas with the goal of submitting at least one item for publication. The students work will be published in a book at the end of the class.

Minimum: 3 Maximum: 12

Advanced Writing (11th-12th grades) \$25

Main, Jeffrey

In this class you will learn about the writing process from the prewriting stage to the final product. We will review mechanics, grammar, and style. Then we will work on different styles of writing including literary, fiction and non-fiction. For each of the four modules you will be expected to turn in a project suitable for inclusion in your college prep portfolio. The cost for the class can be reduced if you already own The Elements of Style by EB White and Strunk 4th edition/50th anniversary ed.

Minimum: 4 Maximum: 12
